After a six-year rebuilding period, the Hahn basketballers have put together another league winning team. This year's team, probably not as potent as the 1964-65 champs, ended the season with a 17-2 record and a 13-game win streak.

The league title was won in a play-off game with United Parcel Service. The game was decided on a last few seconds free throw by Riley Ellis, which put Hahn up by three points and out of reach. Gary Clark and Tony Jourdan paced Hahn with 16 points apiece; John Barnett had 15 points. The big UPS pivotman, Wayne Emge, was high for the game with 20 points; Mark Mason added 17 points to the UPS total.

In the season, the Hahn team tallied 1,195 points for a 63 points a game offensive average, but gave up 52 points a game.

Individually, the team was led by Gary Clark, the ex-Webster County star, who tallied 377 points in 17 appearances for a 22.3 average. "Big" John Barnett, the team's leading rebounder, ended with 356 points for a 19 point average. Tony Jourdan, a late season arrival, saw action in only three games but managed a respectable 17 point average. Rick Tepool was next in line with a 9.3 average. The rest of the roster, consisting of Riley Ellis, player-coach Wally Gardner, Roger Racster, Steve Hames, Jimmy Cooksey, John Hall, and Syl Englert, all carried about a 2 point average. Posey Neuman, an early season starter, posted an 8 point average before he was laid off.

Oh-h-h, my aching back! How many times have you heard this remark? But more important, how many times have you been the victim?

So what causes a backache. Many things, to be sure, and while some are serious, others may be a matter of small changes made by you.

Are your work shoes in good repair? If your daily routine causes you to spend 90% of a day on your feet, you can help your back by being sure to wear shoes that give good support. That excludes sneakers, strap sandals and soft house shoes. Shoes that are out of shape, heels worm over or are too short, will cause backache and needless to say, foot pain too. And how is the condition of your mattress? Old, tired mattresses can cause plenty of restless, sleepless nights, to say nothing of backache. Even a new mattress that is too soft can contribute greatly to backache, and ruin your disposition.

How is your posture? Are you standing correctly? Chin level to the floor, shoulders square, stomach tucked to your backbone, hips tucked in. Back up to a wall, stand tight against it, with stomach pulled in and walk away. You look beautiful. Of course, you can't breathe, but that's a habit we all have. Anyway, look in the mirror and see what you can do about your posture.
