

MANUFACTURING EMPLOYMENT AT ALL TIME HIGH!

Carl Deig, manager of manufacturing, reports that, with employment at peak production, output is three weeks behind schedule to satisfy our backlog of orders. Carl hopes that the quality will continue to improve with the results meaning more satisfied customers. Our inventory is high but several models and sub-assemblies are yet to be produced to give our distributors their requirements.

AG-PRODUCTS MARKETING DIVISION

The 1968 selling season is off to a flying start here in the Ag-Products Division. Orders far exceed those of last year at this time. The sales staff has been busy outlining sales plans with distributor personnel and taking rders for equipment to meet their spring requirements.

The Ag-Products Service Department has been conducting service clinics for distributor service and sales personnel in Minnesota, Arkansas, Georgia, and Evansville. Just one more to go after the first of the year... in Toledo, Ohio. The service clinics have been well received at each location and "thanks" to Louie Carroll... Ralph Acock... and Harold Stevens and Lloyd Hahn... for their part in putting on the "good show" and making them the successful meetings that they were.

Just been talking with Wayne Wallace of the Ag-Products Parts Department. He gave an account of his recent trip to one of our distributors in California. Wayne wants to pass on the word that, if anyone has a notion traveling is fun... forget it! Wayne claims the work days are long... and the nights ll too short!

The Christmas Season is uponius... again...

already ... so soon! But there is no let up. Everyone is keeping their shoulder to the wheel and the long weekends ahead should be restful... helping us to head into 1968 with a renewed vigor!! We are confident we have a real winning combination this year.

HECO HIGHLIGHTS

Heco Sales Division reports total early orders 5% ahead of last year. However, riding mowers are 10% ahead of a year ago at this time. We expect to have 15% more riding mowers on order over a year ago on January 1st, 1968.

Snow blowers are completely sold out for this year. A significant increase in snow blower shipments can be expected in June, July, August, and September of this fiscal year.... providing the snow belt area of the country receives normal snow fall during the January through March period.

Greater promotional and advertising program directed to both the distributor and the dealer is hopefully expected to continue sales growth throughout the spring selling season on mowers, tillers, and riders. The greater portion of the riding mower increase in business is coming from the two new 32" riding mowers introduced for this year.
