MARKETING MANAGER IS CONFERENCE PRESIDENT

"The United States and its farmers can continue to produce food for the world if the country is prepared to take some research risks and if the farmer can make a profit, according to the presiof the 29th annual North Central Weed Control Conference currently at the St. Paul Hilton.

Kenneth Bradfield, market manager for the agriculture products division of Hahn, Inc., Evansville, In., at a panel press conference said "we as a group

must convince others that certain risks are necessary if we are to fulfill our oblications in creating an environment for maximum food and fiber production."

Bradfield, whose firm makes machines for fertilizer applications, said the risks "are in research. We almost had (federal) regulations passed (governing research) that would have limited us to doing only what we know is safe.

"Research is dealing with the unknown...if you have no risk, you have no research," Bradfield said. He admitted industry, "because of the human equation, has made some boo-boos" which have damaged the environment.

"But until research comes up with something new, we have to use the tools we have now to grow the food and fiber we use and export," he said.

Bradfield was supported by R. Phillip Up-church, research manager for Monsanto Agricultural Division, St. Louis, Mo., who said banning pesticides (as now being considered by the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency) "is too often viewed from an emotional viewpoint with the facts not fairly evaluated."

He said restraints should be on the federal level not the state level and if they are not "trivial and unwarranted, the chemical industry will work within them if they don't make the industry unprofitable."

Roy Kottmanm dean of the College of Agriculture at Ohio State University, Columbus, Ohio, said computer projections show that the productivity of land can be increased four or five times what it is now "if research finds the technology to do so."

Indicating that most increased productivity would come through plant modification, Kottman predicted that production can double every 12 years. He said the computer analysis showed the possibility of raising 428 bushels of corn per acre compared with the present average of around 100 and soybean production of 250 bushels compared with the present average of around 30 bushels.

Bradfield added, "In our system, this sort of production will be achieved only if the farmers can make a profit at it. They don't raise food to feed the world's hungry or growing population, but to make a profit.

"The technology must be profitable to the farmer or he won't use it," he said. He predicted that with the current high fertilizer costs, crop size in the next few years will decline because farmers will be able to make a "better profit with 120 bushel-per-acre corn than by spending the money for extra fertilizer to raise 140-bushel corn."

Bradfield estimated that if all pesticides (herbicides, rodenticides, fungicides and insecticides) were banned from agricultural use, farm productivity would be cut in half.


Tuesday evening, December 3rd, found 42

Each year the Factory Store provides LTD-500 Riders for the opening ceremonies at the Hadi Shrine Circus.


This year five riders were used in each of the performances. A total of 55,200 people attended the circus.
