

You have seen this phrase on a big sign downtown, and probably the business establishment involved has a thriving income helping people to "adjust".



Bowling for the Hahn, Inc. team on the final session of the Friday Night Independent League at Franklin Lanes, Jerry Kuester accomplished every bowler's dream as he rolled 12 consecutive strikes for a perfect 300-game. He was battling the fates all the way. The next perfect game in the West Sic bowling establishment's history would be #13 and, Hahn, in its second game of the night, was rolling on alley #13.

Jerry carries a 183 average and his highest previous game was 289. His 300 game was the first 300 at Franklin Lanes since June 4, 1968.

Jerry has already set a new goal. "I'd like to bowl a 700 and 800 series", he said. "But let's take the 700 first. We'll do it one at a time. It's a lot of pressure."
